#### I. Introduction

- A. Attention Getter Every day in the U.S., an average of 18 people die while awaiting organ transplants because of a critical shortage of donors ("Facts and Figures About Organ Donation"). #### 1. Safe.

## 2. Distributing organs.

- Organ transplant recipients are selected on the basis of medical urgency,
  compatibility size and blood chemistries, not race, sex or creed.

- d. During the donation surgery, just prior to removal, an ice cold preservative solution is flushed into each of the organs.
